Goldsmiths are a wellto-do class. A first rate worker earns about 2s. (Re. 1) a day or 36 (Rs. 360) a year, a middling worker Is. to Is. 6d. (8-12 as.) a day or 18 to 27 (Rs. 180-270) a year, and a poor worker 6d. (4 as.) a day or 9 (Rs. 90) a year. Coppersmiths or Tambats and Kasars, of whom there are about seventy families,...
